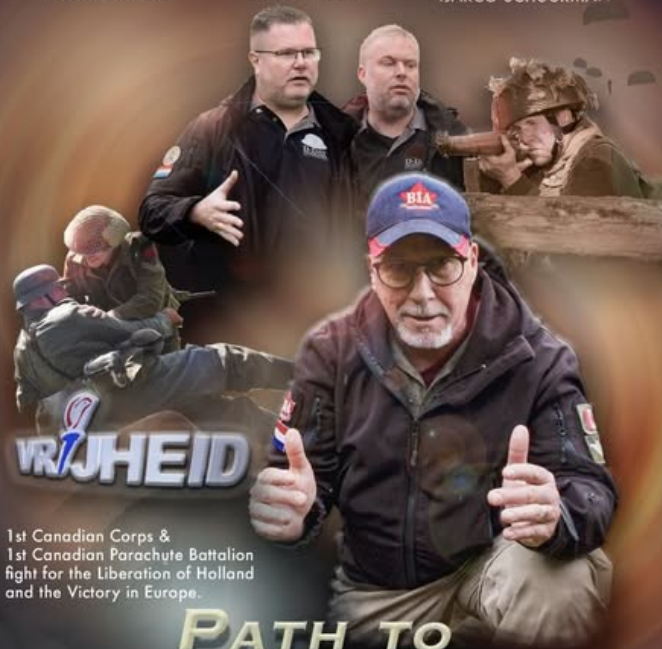

# What's This About?

There are other people out there that are as interested in some of the same Canadian military history as we are.

- Some of these people are here in Canada.
- Others are in other countries, particularly the Netherlands.

Some of these people have made, or are actively making, relevant historical information content (e.g., documentaries, social media content, etc.).

This is about one example – a very recent Canadian Military History documentary produced by a Canadian, with help from a couple buddies in the Netherlands.

And this is another example of a learning opportunity (for me) about Canadian Military History.

# Background

I recently saw some references to “Path to Total Victory” on the following Facebook group.

- “Canadians in Northwest Europe in the Second World War”

The references mentioned a plan to mark the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Victory in Europe by creating a three-episode documentary to give a general overview of the crucial combat operations of the 1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Parachute Battalion and the 1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Corps during the final battles to liberate the Netherlands.

- Episode 1: The 1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Parachute Battalion – Operation Varsity
- Episode 2: The 1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Infantry Division – Operation Cannonball
- Episode 3: The 5<sup>th</sup> Armoured Division and the Dawn of Peace – Operation Cleanser

# “Path to Total Victory”

## 80 Years of Victory in Europe:

To honour this milestone, Bravery In Arms has produced a three-episode documentary series to give a general overview of the crucial combat operations of the 1st Canadian Parachute Battalion and the 1st Canadian Corps during the final battles to liberate the Netherlands and secure total victory over Nazi Germany in May 1945.

### *Topics covered:*

#### *Episode 1: The 1st Canadian Parachute Battalion – Operation Varsity*

March 24th 1945, Focus on the elite 1st Canadian Parachute Battalion, whose daring airborne operation as part of the British 6th Airborne Division, played a significant role in securing key positions across the Rhine, into Germany. The episode chronicles the parachute drop on top of enemy lines, and highlights their daring courage to secure vital grounds in support of the Allied invasion of Germany.

## ***Episode 2: The 1st Canadian Infantry Division - Operation Cannonshot.***

On April 11th, The 1st Canadian Infantry Division undertook the daring assault crossing of the IJssel River. Following the capture of Wilp, the division pressed forward, liberating numerous towns en route to the Grebbe Line. Among these was the city of Apeldoorn, an important regional center. The seizure of Apeldoorn dealt a severe blow to German occupation forces and provided a morale boost to the local population who were long awaiting their day of liberation.

## ***Episode 3: The 5th Armoured Division and the Dawn of Peace - Operation Cleanser***

The final episode reflects on the momentous conclusion of the campaign— The rapid advance of the 5th Armoured Division from Arnhem, moving North towards IJsselmeer Lake. Including the infamous battle of Otterlo and the official surrender of Nazi forces at the De Wereld Hotel in Wageningen on May 5th 1945. This instalment emphasizes the suffering of the Dutch People, honouring the sacrifices made and the enduring legacy of the Canadian forces in bringing freedom to Europe.

# Background

The documentary plan involved deploying, in April 2025, a small filming crew in the Netherlands together with a group of volunteer re-enactors to recreate some battle scenes.

The plan then involved presenting the documentary to the public during Remembrance Week in November 2025.

Who is Roger Chabot?

- Sgt. (Ret.) Canadian Armed Forces
- Born in Quebec.
- Signed up with Royal 22<sup>nd</sup> Regiment (VanDoos).
- In the Airborne Regiment, deployed to Cyprus and Somalia.
- 1994 – Princess Patricia’s Canadian Light Infantry – Croatia, Kosovo (1999).
- 2000 – Posted to Canadian Forces Leadership and Recruit School (CFLRS), in St.-Jean. Basic Training Instructor.
- Eventually trained as an imagery technician (Cold Lake, Valcartier).
- Retired 2005. Moved to Reserves.
- Fully retired 2016 (age 55).
- Painting, touring, and making videos, a big part of his life since retirement.
  - Large video project – Canadian “D-Day Dodgers.” Took team to Italy to follow in footsteps of the 1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Corps.
  - “Bravery In Arms – Canadian Military History brought back to life – Produced and hosted by Veteran, War Artist Roger Chabot.”

A beautiful hike yesterday afternoon in the footsteps of the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders of Canada and the South Saskatchewan Regiment. Starting in Pourville, where we are staying in a beautiful holiday home, I walked towards Le Petit Appeville which was one of the farthest points the Canadians advanced inland during Operation Jubilee. From Le Petit Appeville there is a small hiking trail up the hills towards Dieppe Canadian War Cemetery. A stunning view (and a steep path) shows the former battlefield near Green Beach on 19 August 1942.

For me it really is the feeling that you are walking in the footsteps of these men who gave their lives during this operation. I ended at the cemetery and walked past each and every stone there. Some had a photo placed in front of it. After spending an hour there I hiked the same trail back to Pourville. I bet this is not the last hike to the cemetery I'll make this week.... — at **Dieppe Canadian War Cemetery**.

**Operation Varsity** (24 March 1945) was a successful airborne forces operation launched by Allied troops toward the end of World War II. Involving more than 16,000 paratroopers and several thousand aircraft, it is the largest airborne operation ever conducted on a single day and in one location.<sup>[Note 5]</sup>

*Varsity* was part of Operation Plunder, the Anglo-American-Canadian effort, led by Field Marshal Bernard Montgomery, to cross the northern Rhine River and from there enter Northern Germany. To help British ground forces secure a foothold across the Issel and Rhine rivers in Western Germany, *Varsity* landed two airborne divisions on the Rhine's eastern bank near the village of Hamminkeln and the town of Wesel.<sup>[10]</sup>

Operation Varsity "was the battle that ended" World War Two in Europe, yet it is largely unknown to all but military history buffs.



In the hut no one spoke, no one joked. The assembled British and Canadian paratroop commanders awaited the briefing from their brigade commander on their next major operation. When it came, they were not disappointed. "Gentlemen," bellowed Brig. Gen. James Hill, the well-respected commander of the 3rd Parachute Brigade, "the artillery support is fantastic! And if you are worried about the kind of reception you'll get, just put yourself in the place of the enemy. What would you think," he posited to the troops, "if you saw a horde of ferocious, bloodthirsty paratroopers, bristling with weapons, cascading down upon you from the skies?"

The image set all at ease. Among those assembled for the briefing on Operation Varsity, the airborne assault that would breach the Rhine into the heart of the Reich, was a small group of Canadians who belonged to the 1st Canadian Parachute Battalion.

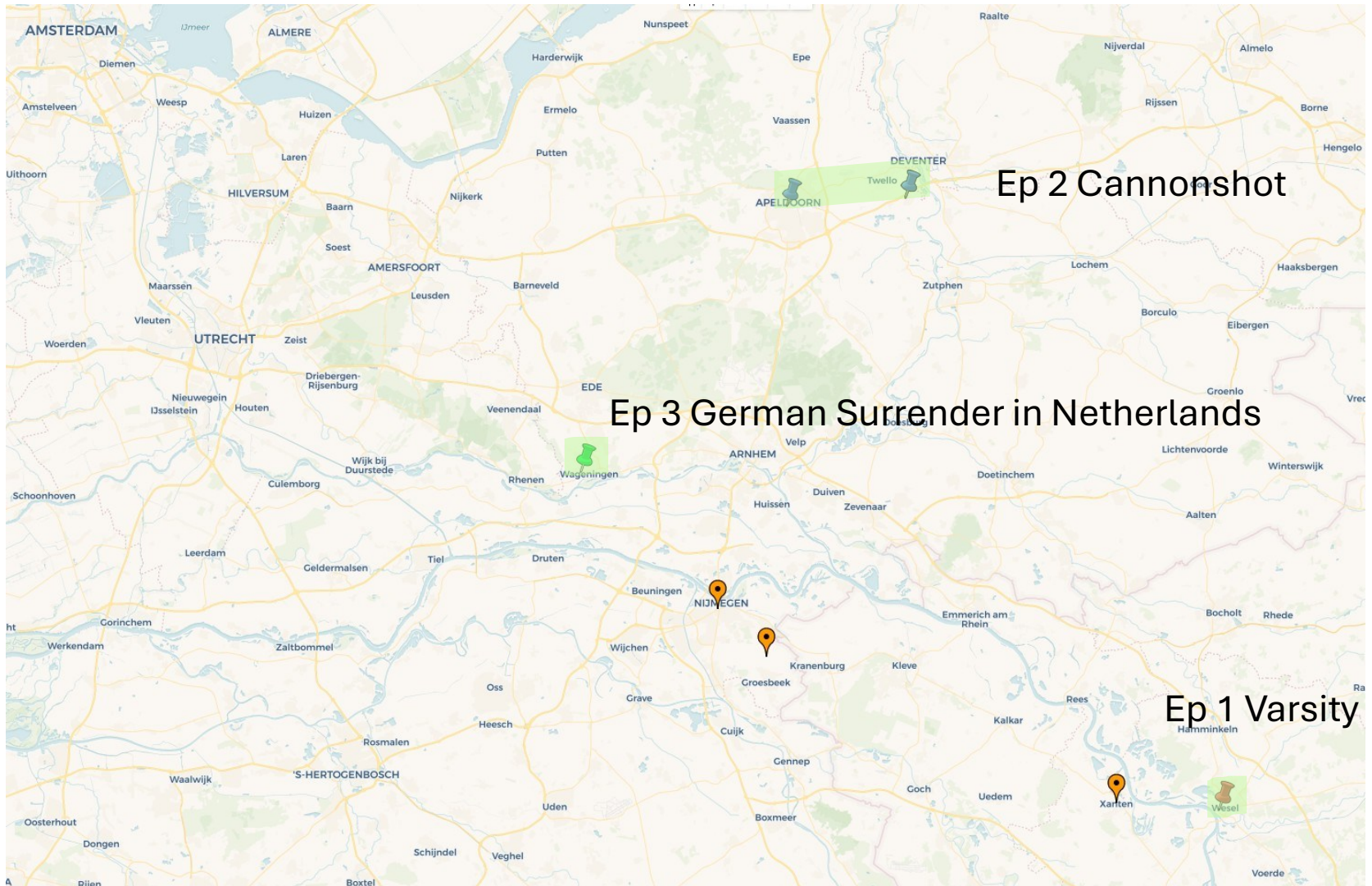
On a personal level, my research of Canada and WW2 never really got further than March 8 1945, when my Uncle Ken was KIA at Xanten Germany. Ken was with the Essex Scottish, and is buried in Groesbeek Canadian War Cemetery. I have visited both Groesbeek and Xanten, as part of my research on Uncle Ken.

Watching “Path to Total Victory” has given me a better understanding of the role of the Canadian Army through the Liberation of the Netherlands, and the end of the war.

- I found the archival footage, battle scene re-enactments, interviews and touring footage in this documentary brought everything to life for me, much better than the books I’ve read. Maybe an old guy thing?

Regarding “Path to Total Victory,” as I mentioned earlier, I knew virtually nothing about Operation Varsity.

- I find this surprising, considering I have well over 1000 skydives myself, starting in the mid-1970’s with old round surplus military parachutes just like the ones in Operation Varsity.
- As a student, I even had a tree landing, like the one described in the documentary. At least no one was shooting at me, not on that jump anyways.
- Shockingly that almost did happen to me many jumps later, while doing a group high altitude night jump down in Florida. When we landed, we were surrounded by heavily armed police who thought we were part of a drug drop. Of course we weren’t, but it was a bit scary.
- But clearly not as scary as what the 1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Parachute Battalion experienced in Operation Varsity.
